INTRODUCTION

Section 3 includes a detailed inventory of the Village of Beulah recreation facilities. The inventory also includes brief descriptions of public recreational facilities in Benzie County including both Federal and State owned facilities. Lastly, the Recreation Inventory includes an outline of recreation facilities that are Privately Owned.

The inventory was completed with assistance from Village staff, Parks and Recreation Committee Members, *1997 Village Master Plan*, *2010 Master Plan brainstorming Pubic Input*, and on-site inventory completed in January and February of 2010.

INVENTORY CRITERIA

The recreation facilities have been inventoried for park type, size, and service area. The facilities have also been evaluated for accessibility using the accessibility assessment criteria set forth by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. The Village of Beulah shares a common goal with the State to develop universally accessible recreation facilities and has completed an accessibility assessment on all of the Village recreational amenities and parks. The assessment is ranked on a system of 1-5 and is based on the following definitions:

- 1 = none of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 2 = some of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 3 = most of the facilities/park areas meet accessibility guidelines
- 4 = the entire park meets accessibility guidelines
- 5 = the entire park was developed/renovated using the principals of universal design

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has developed definitions for park types and defines sixteen types of parks. The following ten park types have been included as they are the most applicable to the Village.

Mini Park (MP) - used to address unique or isolated recreational needs. Typically the park is less than 1 acre in size and is located within ¼ mile of a residential setting.

Neighborhood Park (NP) - serves as a recreational and social focus for the neighborhood. It is usually 5 to 10 acres in size and less than ½ mile from a residential setting.

Connector Trails (CT) - multipurpose trail that provides safe travel for pedestrians to and from parks and around the community. It is usually a single purpose hard-surfaced trail for pedestrians or bicyclists / in-line skaters and is typically located within railroad right-of-ways.

School Park (SP) - park combined with a school site. The location is dependent upon the school property and size can vary depending on the function of the park.

Natural Resource Area (NRA) - land set aside for preservation of significant natural resources, open space, and visual aesthetics/buffering. There are no size requirements and location is variable.

Special Use (SU) - usually a single purpose recreation facility. The size and location will vary depending on the use.

Community Park (CP) - serves a broader purpose than a neighborhood park. The focus is on meeting community-based recreation needs, as well as preserving unique landscapes and open spaces. It usually serves 2 or more neighborhoods and is within ½ mile to 3 mile distance of the neighborhood. The size is usually between 30 and 50 acres.

On-Street Bikeways (BW) – paved segments of roadway that serve as a way to safely separate bicyclists from vehicular traffic. This can be a bike route with designated portions of the roadway for preferential use of bicyclists or bike lane with shared portions of the roadway providing separation between vehicles and bicyclists, such as paved shoulders.

Greenways (G) - tie park system components together to form a continuous park environment. There is no size requirement and location is dependent on availability.

Sports Complex (SC) - consolidation of programmed athletic fields and associated facilities strategically located throughout the community. There is usually a minimum of 25 acres.

BEULAH BEACH WATERFRONT PARK

Size: 2+ acres (over 2000' of public beach frontage along Lake Street).

Location: Beulah Beach Waterfront Park is located on the eastern waterfront of the Village and can be accessed from Prospect, Commercial, Clark and Pleasant Streets via Benzie Boulevard and US-31.

Background: The beach is located on the eastern shore of Crystal Lake—the heart and soul of the Village of Beulah. Crystal Lake is the tenth largest inland lake in Michigan. Due to an accidental lowering of the lake in the fall of 1873, a beautiful sandy beach became exposed for future generations to use. Beulah is the only village located directly on Crystal Lake. This park includes over 2000' of public shoreline on beautiful Crystal Lake. Spring-fed Cold Creek flows into the Lake at the public launch site and offers many opportunities for interaction and nature observation.

Funding / Grants: The Beach Park has not received any previous grant funding.

Facility Evaluation:

- Direct access to Crystal Lake
- Bath house with permanent rest rooms (condition (FAIR) and number of fixtures (Bath house: Women: 1 sink, 2 stools, 3 changing stalls, Men: 1 sink, 1 stool, 1 urinal, 3 changing stalls, 2 showerheads on the exterior of the building)
- Portable rest rooms (1)
- Children's playground with swings, slide, and multi-purpose gym (swings has 4 seats in poor condition)
- Concrete retaining wall (bench) and 2 park benches (recycled plastic)
- Picnic tables and barbeque grills (none in the beach environs)
- Beach volleyball (1 court set up)
- T-dock fishing (Size 4' x 150' and condition of dock is poor)
- Bike rack (1 metal in good condition)
- Boat launch (73' x 30', fair to good condition)



- Designated swim area
- Leased dock & shore station space on a reserved basis

Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, trash removal and general maintenance.

Principal Use: Leisure-time beach activities including sun-bathing, swimming and volleyball (see inventory above). Other primary activities include small boat launching and fishing.

Park Type / Service Area: The Park not only serves as a neighborhood park, but more importantly a regional park that functions as a regional destination in Northwest Michigan.

Current Planning Efforts: See Section 5

Accessibility Assessment: 2

The Park has minimal accessible sidewalks, changes in grade that limit access, and a main street running parallel to it.



BEULAH VILLAGE PARK

Size: Approximately 1 acre

Location: Beulah Park is located at the southern end of the village at the intersection of Spring Valley, Crystal Avenue, Benzie Boulevard and Prospect Streets.

Background: The Park is the hub for community events in the Village of Beulah with its main function being that of social gatherings. It is used for art/craft fairs, concerts, picnics and has many mature trees. Other events there include: Halloween Maze, Chili Cook-off, Fall Festival with soup contest, Christmas Magic Events, Winterfest and 4th of July activities. The Park's eastern boundary is the Betsie Valley Trail which runs from Thompsonville to Elberta/Frankfort on Lake Michigan.

Funding / Grants: The Park has not received any public grants for improvements.

Facility Evaluation:

- Tennis court (1), enclosed/fenced, fair to good condition
- Game area (4-square & Hopscotch)
- Covered pavilion (20' x 40'), concrete floor, and is in good condition
- Barbeque grills (4) in fair condition
- Picnic tables (6) typically placed in the summer, 5 in poor to fair condition, one new table (recycled plastic material)
- Park benches (2) – 1 in poor to fair condition and 1 new (recycled plastic materials used for all new park benches)
- Electricity 110 panel/100 amps (limited power for larger events)
- Water (hose bibs in the garden area maintained by local garden group "Plant It Wild")
- Time capsule under rock, (1990-2090)
- Flower garden (maintained by Plant-it-Wild)
- Historic Marker - Erected in 1978 and references the 1915 failed attempt to connect Crystal Lake to Lake Michigan.



Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, trash removal and general maintenance.

Principal Use: Community events, picnicking and tennis.

Park Type / Service Area: The Park serves as a neighborhood park for community events and also provides overflow space for the waterfront during peak summer-time use periods.

Current Planning Efforts: Park improvements are currently under consideration.

Accessibility Assessment: 2

The majority of the Park is grass with limited accessible walks.



BEULAH BEACH RV PARK

Size: Approximately 1.5 acres

Location: Located on Crystal Lake along the southernmost portion of the public waterfront.

Background: This Beulah Beach Recreation Vehicle (RV) Park is owned and operated by the Village of Beulah. This land was donated to the Village. By making a reservation early in the year space can be reserved for the entire summer to be spent on Crystal Lake. Preseason and postseason rentals are available on a daily basis. The RV Park is directly connected to the Village Park and is an easy walk to the downtown. Boats can be moored out in front of the Park.

Funding / Grants: None pursued to date.

Facility Evaluation:

- Direct access to Crystal Lake
- Direct access to the main Village Park
- 20 RV Sites with electrical, sewer, cable, and water hookups
- Bathhouse with showers
- Fish-cleaning station - permanent station with water.
- Picnic tables (20) - poor to fair condition
- Fire pits (5) – reduced number of fire pits to encourage interaction and limit smoke
- Parking - (2) small vehicles per site, a few additional spaces available in the Park and just outside the Park area. Paved road through the park but parking at sites is on grass.
- Brick Building - typically used in case of bad weather and for larger groups to use for activities, can put several picnic tables inside if needed, also provides space for campers to recycle

Operation and Maintenance:

Park Managers are responsible for operation and maintenance during June, July and August. The remaining months of the year are the responsibility of the Village DPW.

Principal Use: Recreational Vehicle Park



Park Type / Service Area: The Park serves mostly visitors to the area coming from as far as Arizona and California.

Current Planning Efforts: Current planning efforts include funding allocation to upgrade the site electrical service and pedestals.

Accessibility Assessment: 1

The only accessible surface is the paved access road which provides no walks or bike lanes. The sites are grass and provide limited access to the water.

BETSIE VALLEY TRAILHEAD

Size: 0.33 acre

Location: The location of this building is found at the former site of the original train depot (the intersection of South Benzie Boulevard, Prospect Avenue, Spring Valley Street, Crystal Avenue, and the Betsie Valley Trail.

Background: The trailhead is not an official park, but is across from Beulah Park and is open to the public year-round. It was constructed with funds raised throughout the community by the Benzie Sunrise Rotary Club, in cooperation with the Village of Beulah, and Friends of the Betsie Trail. The building design is a replica of the original train depot which was located in downtown Beulah.

Funding / Grants: The MDNR supported the construction and property, but put no funds into the project.

Facility Evaluation:

- Direct access to the Betsie Valley Trail
- Direct access to downtown Beulah
- Restroom building (excellent condition)
- Drinking fountain
- Covered picnic area with concrete pad (15' x'35') with 6 picnic tables and litter receptacles (good condition)
- Electrical (inside and outside GFI's)
- Bike rack (1 fixed)
- Bench (1) - donated (recycled plastic material) (excellent condition)
- Calendar of local events (posted on the signage); inside is a bulletin board with events and a promotions rack used by many vendors (Chamber, Crystal Mountain, Stores, etc.)
- "Garden of Possibilities" (native drought resistant plants)
- Gravel Parking (15 spaces)

Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, trash removal, and maintenance and supply for the public restroom building and parking lot.



Principal Use: The Trailhead serves as a rest stop for users of the Betsie Valley Trail. It provides a place for pedestrians, bikers, snowmobilers (who use the Beulah to Thompsonville portion of the trail) and downtown visitors to sit, eat and use the restroom and drinking fountain.

It is used regularly by the Beulah Darcy Library for cookie and book sales and the Rotary holds their annual steak fry at this location as well as other community events. The Crystal Lake Central Business Association (CLCBA) helps to run most festivals and activities including Santa Claus for Children at Christmas Time. The small native garden in front of the building was planted by the local school children.

Park Type / Service Area: The Park serves not only as a trailhead for a multi-modal trail, but also as a neighborhood park.

Current Planning Efforts: None at this time

Accessibility Assessment: 4

The Park building and surrounding facilities are newer and were built to meet ADA; however, the aggregate surface on the trail and gravel parking lot are limiting and do not provide universal access.

FAIR PARK

Size: 0.5 acre

Location: The Park is located on the southern shore of Crystal Lake where Benzie Street terminates and is the westernmost park in the Village.

Background: This property was donated by the Fair family. In 2009 the Park was upgraded and enhanced with Village funds. During this renovation the beach was cleaned, landscape timbers were installed as a breakwall, and additional beach sand was added. The Park has mature trees for shade and a grassy area. The Park usage increased dramatically after these improvements were finished.

It is nestled in a quiet neighborhood, with private residences surrounding it. It is enjoyed by and convenient to our village mobile home park residents. It is adjacent to the Betsie Valley Trail which goes to Frankfort/Elberta, and is used for biking/walking/jogging. This trail has a crushed stone surface. This park is primarily used for swimming, sunbathing, and picnicking.

Funding / Grants: Upgraded with Village Funds

Facility Evaluation:

- Direct access to Crystal Lake (No Barrier-free access)
- Picnic tables (2) poor to fair condition
- Barbeque grill (1) good condition
- Portable bathroom (BF unit placed seasonally)
- Park Bench (1) new recycled material
- Bike rack (1) new
- local family donated crimson king maples (2) fall 2009
- Parking - no formal area (mostly a walk/bike to mini park)

Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, beach clean-up and trash removal.



Principal Use: The park is primarily used for swimming, sunbathing, and picnicking by private residences surrounding it.

Park Type / Service Area: Mini Park

Current Planning Efforts: None at this time

Accessibility Assessment: 1

Although recent improvements were made to facilities better access to the water, the Park has no facilities that provide for or enhance accessibility.

LIBRARY PARK

Size: 4000 Sft. (approximately 100' x 40')

Location: The Park is located adjacent to Benzie Boulevard between Commercial Avenue and Clark Streets in downtown Beulah.

Background: The space has always existed as public greenspace, but was just named "Library Park" in 2008 because it fronts the new Darcy Library of Beulah. The beauty of this park is that Cold Creek runs through it. The Cold Creek is fondly remembered as a very famous smelt dipping stream. The smelt are no longer present but the gravel bottom is ideal for spawning trout. Large shade trees provide a pleasant environment for sitting and relaxing outdoors. The Park is frequented by locals and visitors shopping in downtown Beulah and those visiting the Darcy Library.

The Village also offered a small section of land adjacent to the Library patio for a sculpture denoting the "Three Tribes of the Great Lakes". The sculpture was funded by a grant from the Grand Traverse Band which was dedicated in the spring of 2009.

Funding / Grants: Upgraded with Village Funds

Facility Evaluation:

- Direct view and access to Cold Creek
- Direct access to Darcy Library of Beulah
- Concrete Sidewalk (perimeter access only)
- Parking on Benzie Boulevard
- Picnic table (1) donated (recycled plastic material)
- Park benches (2) donated (recycled plastic material)
- Wi-Fi internet capacity (from Library)

Operation and Maintenance: Library volunteers help with maintenance.

Principal Use: "Lunch spot", creek and wildlife viewing, library access



Park Type / Service Area: The Park principally serves as a mini park for locals, but also provides a recreational destination for library users coming from around the County as well as visitors to the downtown.

Current Planning Efforts: None at this time

Accessibility Assessment: 2

The Park does provide barrier-free perimeter access, but does not provide any universal access to the creek or amenities in the Park.

NORTHWAY PARK

Size: approximately 0.5 acre

Location: The Park is located in the middle of a residential neighborhood on Center Street between Elmwood and Birchwood Street.

Background: The property was donated to the Village by the Northway family. It offers many amenities to those who play tennis and bring their children to play in the playground.

Funding / Grants: Upgraded with Village Funds

Facility Evaluation:

- Tennis court (1) fenced / good condition
- Swings - Metal set with 4 swings, plastic seats, seats are in poor condition
- Slide - Metal (fall zones are not safe as well as surfacing around the play equipment)
- Teeter Totter (4 person)
- Bike rack (1) new
- Barbeque grill (1) good condition
- Picnic table (1) fair to good condition

Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, and trash removal.

Principal Use: Tennis, playground for children, and limited open lawn for recreating.

Park Type / Service Area: The Park functions primarily as a Neighborhood Park.

Current Planning Efforts: None at this time

Accessibility Assessment: 1

Currently, there is no sidewalk access to the Park or within the Park. The Park's surface is primarily grass with the exception of the tennis court. None of the playground equipment provides for universal access.



TRAPP PARK

Size: 1.8 acres

Location: The Park is located on Clark Street adjacent to the US-31 Highway overpass.

Background: The property was donated to the Village by the Trapp family. Trapp Park has been designed for the pre-teen and teenagers of the Village and is located along side of the Cold Creek sediment pond. The sediment from Cold Creek is trapped here before the creek empties into Crystal Lake. Its eastern boundary is US-31.

Funding / Grants: Upgraded with Village Funds

Facility Evaluation:

- Four basketball hoops (no nets), Asphalt surface
- Skateboard half-pipe ramp (1)
- Box with grinder rail (1)
- Bike rack (1)
- Picnic tables (3 permanent)
- Park benches (1 permanent)
- Fishing by the pond
- Concrete sidewalk

Operation and Maintenance: The Village maintenance includes grass cutting, leaf raking, and trash removal.

Principal Use: Skateboarding, basketball, and other active recreational activities.

Park Type / Service Area: The Park functions primarily as a Neighborhood Park.

Current Planning Efforts: None at this time

Accessibility Assessment: 2

The surface is primarily grass and gravel with the exception of a perimeter concrete sidewalk.



OTHER PUBLIC RECREATION FACILITIES IN THE VICINITY OF VILLAGE OF BEULAH

Other significant public recreation facilities include those facilities not owned or operated by Village of Beulah, however are available to Village residents. For references several of facilities most readily available to residents and visitors to Beulah are provided below. For a complete list of Benzie County recreational and cultural resources - please refer to the [Benzie County Recreation and Cultural Master Plan 2009-2014](#) available online at the County website www.benzieco.net.

FEDERAL FACILITIES:

Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore - National Park Service (NPS):

(U.S. Department of Interior/National Park Service) National Lakeshore located northwest of the Village along the Lake Michigan Shoreline.

Platte River Campground - provides over 150 campsites (96 with electrical service), 8 modern restrooms with showers, 200 person amphitheatre.

Platte River Picnic Area - Accessible area with 4 shelters, canoe and kayak launch, fish cleaning station, walkway along river, benches, and parking for 27 vehicles

Historic Frankfort Coast Guard Station

The building has a *Designation Eligible status* on the National Register of Historic Places is located across the street from the New Coast Guard Station. Crystal Lake Art Center plans to renovate and occupy it as a regional center for the arts.

STATE FACILITIES (MDNR):

State Forest Campground and Cross Country Ski Trail

Campground with pit toilets and no running water

Michigan Shore-to-Shore Trail

State horse riding and hiking trail from Lake Huron to Lake Michigan

Betsie River State Game Area

Wildlife management area in Crystal Lake and Gilmore Townships

Betsie River Water Trail and Corridor

Canoe, kayak, and small boat usage. Designated Natural Wild and Scenic River

Railroad Point Natural Area (MDNR/Benzie County)

66 acres of wooded steep bluffs and hills on Railroad Point, with nature trails, 2700 feet of frontage on Crystal Lake and the Betsie Valley Trail, and parking

Crystal Lake Outlet Property

MDNR Boating Access Division owns 29 acres between the outlet on Crystal Lake and the West End of the Railroad Point Natural Area. Swimming area with limited parking

Platte River State Forest Campground

Approximately 1350 feet of frontage on the Platte River with 26 tent/RV campsites

Boat Launch Sites (MDNR/County/Other)

(Almira Twp. (10); Benzonia Twp. (2); Blaine Twp. (2); Crystal Twp. (1); Inland Twp. (1); Lake Twp. (3) including Big & Little Platte Lake Access sites (MDNR); City of Frankfort (1); Village of Beulah (1)

Betsie Valley Trail (MDNR / Benzie County)

The converted rail right-of-way provides a non-motorized trail link from Thompsonville to Elberta/Frankfort

Veteran's Memorial State Forest Campground

40 acres with approximately 1400 feet of Platte River frontage, located on the south side of US-31. Facilities include 21 camping sites, parking, and water

PUBLIC SCHOOL FACILITIES (Beulah Vicinity only):

Benzie Central Junior/Senior High School Complex (Benzie County Central School District) –Football/track stadium, baseball & softball diamonds, soccer field, gymnasium, basketball court, auditorium, classrooms, and meeting rooms

Crystal Lake Elementary School (Benzie County Central School District) K-5 with gymnasium, cafeteria, multipurpose field with basketball, soccer, softball, and parking.

OTHER MAJOR PUBLIC RECREATIONAL FACILITIES IN THE COUNTY:**Ransom Lake Natural Area** (Almira Township)

220 acres with 3500 feet of frontage on Ransom Creek used for hunting, fishing, hiking, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, canoeing, kayaking, wildlife observation, and snowmobiling

Almira Township Park

42 acre neighborhood park with 3 baseball diamonds, basketball courts, volleyball courts, and a one-mile paved walking trail, playscapes, swings, and pavilion

Memorial Park (Benzonia Township)

31 acre community park has a picnic area, 4 baseball diamonds, a soccer field, a volleyball court, parking, water, lighting, a storage building, 3 restrooms, pavilion with power and a nine-hole disc-golf course

Zada Price Park (Benzie County/Benzie County Road Commission)

Five-acre community park has Crystal Lake access for swimming, and provides for launching of canoes, kayaks, and light boats (road-end within frontage) and off-road parking for Snowmobile and ice-fishing access

Crystal Lake Township Park

90 acre community park consisting of undeveloped, wooded, and hilly open space with 600 feet of frontage on the Betsie Valley Trail and the Betsie River

Lake Township Park

Two acre community park has 300 feet of frontage on the Platte River with swimming, canoeing, kayaking, picnic tables, grills, benches, and a canoe launch site

Frankfort Lake Michigan Beach (City of Frankfort)

12 acre community park with swimming beach, beach volleyball, swing sets, parking, benches and walking and fishing on the north pier along the river outlet and the north break wall

Frankfort City Marina and Borwell Yacht Basin (City of Frankfort)

Part of Mineral Springs Park this Michigan State Waterways Commission funded public facility is a complete marina with 71 transient and seasonal slips for 30 to 60 foot boats

Elberta Historic Waterfront Park (Village of Elberta)

10 acre community park with 1200 feet of scenic water frontage has a covered picnic pavilion, two parking lots (54 spaces), playground, paths and trails, amphitheater, fishing deck, drinking fountain, life saving station, and restrooms

QUASI-PUBLIC / CONSERVANCY RECREATIONAL LANDS:**Trapp Farm Nature Preserve** (Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy)

115 acres of wetlands with 2000 feet of tributaries of the Cold Creek, with nature trails, boardwalk, and parking off Narrow Gauge Road

Fruithaven Forest Preserve (Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy)

176 acres of forest overlooking Upper Herring Lake. Open for hiking. Hunting with permission from the Conservancy

Mott Preserve at Arcadia Dunes (Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy)

360 acres. Open for hiking, cross-country skiing and snow-shoeing. Single track mountain bike trails. Hunting with permission from the Conservancy

Greenpointe Dunes Preserve (Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy)

241 acres also know as the Ranke Property. Open for hiking, cross country skiing and snow-shoeing. Hunting

Benzie Area Historical Museum (Benzie County Historical Society)

The original Congregational Church that has been remodeled and now houses a unique group of historical artifacts.

Point Betsie Light Station (Benzie County)

Also known as Pint aux Becs Scies. The lighthouse is one of the most visited in Michigan and was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1984. It was retired by the U.S. Coast Guard and given to Benzie County

PRIVATELY OWNED RECREATION FACILITIES IN VILLAGE OF BEULAH

Privately owned recreation facilities include those facilities that may require a user fee and have limited access. It is important to understand that these private facilities do contribute to the inventory of recreation facilities and provide an important component to the overall recreation inventory.
